Our homegroups at WBC...

Homegroups are small groups of people (usually between 8 - 12) who meet during the week to share together, pray, discuss the Bible and develop great friendships. They are a vital part of our church life, providing an opportunity for:

- **Friendship** we can get to know each other and share our lives together at a deeper level.
- Fellowship we can grow spiritually by studying the Bible together, listening and learning from one another in a relaxed, friendly environment.
- **Family** we can encourage and care for one another, pray for and support each other in different ways.
- Food and fun we can relax and enjoy social times together.

WBC homegroups generally meet for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours every fortnight, getting together either in someone's home or in our church lounge. At the moment we have 6 homegroups with a variety of meeting times, weekdays and locations in the Wymondham area.

Why are homegroups important?

- ✓ Jesus calls us to a community of believers who share their lives with one another and enjoy fellowship together. (*Acts 2:42-47; Hebrews 10:24-25*)
- ✓ As Christians, our love for one another and our commitment to each other are hallmarks of our faith. (*John 13:35; Philippians 2:1-4*)
- Homegroups allow people to build friendships at a deeper level than is possible by only meeting together on a Sunday. It is easy to get 'lost in the crowd' in a large gathering, so it's great to have a group of friends you already know and can chat to after service or during the week.
- We encourage everyone at Wymondham Baptist Church to join a homegroup. Here's what people say about their homegroup...

Inward – Upward – Outward

Each group has an 'upward', 'inward' and 'outward' focus:

- An '**inward**' focus towards each other encouraging and caring for each other and growing closer in fellowship over time.
- An '**upward**' focus towards God deepening our relationship with Him in worship, prayer, Bible study, discipleship.
- An '**outward'** focus towards those outside the group such as:
 - A welcoming and inclusive atmosphere, open to new members to join the group.
 - Supporting an outward-facing church activity such as a WBC mission partner, Samaritan's Purse.
 - Promoting Christian witness and outreach, both as individuals and as a group.

Keeping close to the centre...

Our homegroup leaders are WBC members who have a heart for God's people and understand the value of small groups. A key part of their role is to encourage all group members to participate, creating a safe space for sharing and prayer.

Homegroup leaders meet together several times a year for mutual encouragement, learning and sharing inspirational ideas.

And especially important, they hear from our minister Paul Smith who updates them on our shared vision and how it applies to homegroups. This way, we are all connected into the heart of the church's vision, as Jesus told us all to remain connected to Him, the True Vine (*John 15:5*).
