Pastor

For my annual report I wish to give you some highlights of the things we have seen in the past 12 months. Cathy and I record events that happen in the church's life throughout the year.

January - At the start of the year we launched our verse for the year and focused our minds on what God had in store for us. We began the year with an ECO themed worship walk, and we were also blessed with a visit from Alan and Megan Barker as you will read about further in this report. Our sermon series for January and February was called 'I will build my church' looking at the type of church that we believed Jesus is building here at WBC and recognising that unless He builds the house we labour in vain. We also commenced our monthly praise and worship evenings, these were all based on the theme of prayer styles and we began by looking at why we praise.

February - we were visited by the regional minister David Mayne as he attended Roots Community Cafe. He was very encouraged by what has been an exceptional growth in this important ministry. We held our first Cafe Church of the year. Also this month we started hosting a new group called Menscraft. This is run by the local council and is a safe space for men to explore their wellbeing. Our praise evening' focus was adoration.

March - as the spring began to take hold we took time to reflect on the national day of Covid memorial. We started a new sermon series looking into the life of Moses, the making of the man. I attended the regional ministers conference where it was good to see what God is doing in the wider life of the Baptist church. We held a very successful quiz evening with funds raised for the building project.

Sadly this month saw the death of David Fisher, whom though only with us as a church for a short while, had a massive impact on us, especially those in his home group.

We held our Easter services which included a meditation/ prayer stations event on Maundy Thursday. We also took part in the walk of witness with out brothers and sisters from the Wymondham church network and an all age service on Easter Sunday

April - we began the month by having the stone worked cleaned on the north elevation of the church in preparation for any future building works. Though the walls did not come up as clean as we would have liked it was clear to see the marked difference. There were also meetings with the architect to push

forward on the planned works. Various events took place including Uniform Swap, Craft and Crumpets and an ECO celebration as we continued our good work as an ECO church. We also held a deacons' election with Gill Price being re-elected and Keith Hilton and Mathew Mutakonya coming on to the leadership.

May - the whole leadership team embarked on some appraisal training and began to gel as a group working together. I had the privilege of being grilled by children from Browick Road school which was a good time and great to be able to talk about who we are as a Baptist church. I also preached at Witard Road Baptist church as we continued building a good relationship there. We also held our first film showing again raising funds for the building project.

June - at the very start of the month we held a service focused on GEM and the work that Rachel Spencer carries out. We were visited by representatives

from the EBA with regards to our Home Mission grant which is always a good opportunity for us to talk about the work we do. ECO church and Roots led us in taking part in the Big Green Week. We held another event which this time was led by a gospel choir and a great evening was had by all. We also held baptism classes for those who felt led to explore if baptism was right for them. This



month also saw the Baptists Together conference take place.

July - we held several uniform swaps during the Roots sessions and also took part in Wymondham in Bloom with judging taking place. Robbie organised an afternoon tea fundraiser which was excellent.

Sadly this month we lost long standing church member Jack Copper as he died. He was a very special man and is missed enormously by us all. We held a baptism service at the end of the month with 4 people being baptised and it included the dedication of Emily. It was a fantastic celebration and a joy as Lara, Val, Olivia and Freya shared testimony and took the plunge. This is exactly why we exist.

August - the home groups led the services through the summer and as always it was good to see more people involved in the life of the church. For many churches summer is a time when not much happens, NOT so at WBC! We held a summer concert featuring the Hemsby singers as another fund raising activity. Roots was busy with young families and again held uniform swaps.

We held the celebration service for Jack and a time of fellowship took place afterwards.

Sept - we started the new term as such with a church BBQ. The weather was fantastic and during this month we started to see more growth in the church with attendance on Sunday mornings increasing. We held our TWAM collection which is always well supported by the community. There was a dedication service for Remy held on a Saturday morning with family and friends enjoying the service and also making use of the garden afterwards to have refreshments.

Ruth worked hard and took part in a meeting with other churches in town to network and share ideas and encourage one another.

We held another cafe church session.

Oct - we focused on another mission partner as we heard about the work of the Falconer trust via Neil. We also held a Sponsored Bible Readathon, with people from all over the place reading scripture live via webcast and again raising funds for our building project.

Once more we held our Shoebox Sunday service with stacks of boxes again sent out across the world this year.

Nov. - Uniform Bank opened again at Roots. The Leadership Team had an Away Day led by Vic Wright. It was a really pivotal moment in the way we are working together and was a very encouraging time.

I attended the BU Mission Forum learning about mission in the wider context of Baptist life, and I also attended a NAMS meeting in Southend.

At the end of the month we hosted and took part in Safeguarding Training.

Dec.- saw me leading Children's Work in all of December. this was a fantastic time and I believe a real witness to the youth of WBC but also to the whole fellowship as it showed how important our children are to the life of the church. I had great fun leading the youngsters and learning from them. They then led an all age service on the Sunday morning immediately before Christmas with a pop up nativity. It was so good and the whole church - a enjoyed the time together. That evening we held our traditional Carol service.



Early in December we held another event with the Hemsby Singers Christmas Concert.

And finally, we celebrated together on Christmas morning where we were blessed with a few visitors.

So......as you can see from the long list we are a very busy and active church!!! Lots of good things going on and I haven't even covered the teaching that has taken place each Sunday throughout the year! But a highlight from that for me did include a sermon series looking at the gifts of the Holy Spirit. This alongside my time with the youth in December was my favourite part of my role as we explored together each other's gifting. It was really encouraging to see the way the whole church embraced this time and the release of some people from years of misunderstanding.

This alongside the baptism services are what I love. To explore together our faith, our journey, and learning from each other. It has, as always been an honour, a privilege and very humbling to be your pastor. I look forward to the future with excitement.

Prayer Life at WBC

Sunday Youth Church

Group: School years Reception-Year 6

Ramona, Ruth and Tracy continue to lead the middle group of children on a rota basis, supported by Daisy. The group extends over seven school year groups, so we have opportunity to be a continuous influence over several years of these children's lives. At the same time, that wide range presents the challenge of preparing lessons to appeal to children from ages 4 to 10. In the last year we have seen several of the children move up into the next group, which means we have lost familiar faces.

However, several new children have joined us this year, and seeing them begin to relax, getting to know us and starting to open up, reminds us that

we do not know the full story of what challenge any of our youngsters face in their lives. We lead the lessons trusting that God is working in them, and praying that He will use our



words and our time together to speak to the children in ways that speak to their everyday lives.

The curriculum we use is built of three separate but linked lessons around a specific theme. Modern life means that the children's attendance is unpredictable, and absence can affect the overall learning.

Leading the children's group is a blessing for the adults, but building a firm foundation of faith is a responsibility that we feel should be shared not just with parents, but with the church as a whole.

We therefore present four prayer requests to the church:

Pray for the children, recognising that growing up is hard anyway, and life today throws challenges at them which we will never understand.

Pray for all the youth leaders and parents, who share the responsibility of supporting the children in developing an individual relationship with God.

Pray that as God sends families to us, the right people will step forward to support all the youth work. Across all the youth groups we are too few, who have each been doing this for a very long time.

Pray for the wider church, keeping in your mind and heart that together we are creating the children's earliest experiences of life in Christian fellowship.

Friday Night Youth

Emma and I have been running Friday night youth group for around 11 years now! We have been supported by Jamie Burke for many of those years and in the last year we've also been joined by Jason O Dell.

It is a real blessing to look back and see how some of our young people have grown, not just physically, but also spiritually. It is often the case that you do not notice growth until you look back. Our numbers on these evenings fluctuates, as they have done throughout the years, where there were points in the past year when we were really low on numbers and to be honest we considered the viability of the group. However, it was on reflection when we looked at how God has worked through the young people in the past we felt it wasn't time to give up yet. We have since seen our numbers on the increase. Some weeks we can have up to 17 young people & just of late we have seen some new people join us.

But for us it is the growth in the young people's faith which has been so encouraging. The evenings consist of the young people having 45 minutes of free time where they can meet up, play various different games or just chill. Then we have tuck, where they take it in turns to serve one another. For the final half an hour we spend doing some teaching. Since the start of the year

we have changed things up whereby we now play a worship song via video, then they play a team game based on the theme for the evening, some Bible study and a memory verse for the session and we close in prayer, reflecting on what we have been studying. We have also enjoyed the Christmas party which the group ask for every year and so enjoy. God has been evident in the group as we see them sharing prayers, asking questions, encouraging each other and in the way they engage with the studies.

Going forward we would ask for your prayers in the continued growth both in numbers and the youngsters' faith, for energy to keep going, and for the wisdom to know when it's time for us to stop, if that is indeed what we should do, but more importantly that we disciple others to help take this group forward.

Finally thank you for allowing us the space and the support.

At our Leadership Team Away Day in November - kindly facilitated by Vic Wright and hosted by Attleborough Baptist Church - we decided that we should increase time for reflection and prayer in our monthly meetings. We see prayer as vital in the upcoming year of change and challenge.

Building extension project

Throughout 2024, the Building Project Steering Group worked hard to get us ready for the next project phase. David Frith undertook extensive preparatory work for building to be able to commence in 2025, such as finalising architect's plans, checking out the building foundations. Kate Kinsey and Grace Burke focused tirelessly on external fundraising, bringing us close to our £520K target. Paul Smith, Cathy Finch, and Keith Hilton have also been major contributors to the group. We can only marvel at the specialist skills, experience and dedication that God has provided in these fellow Christians: 'God is not unjust; He will not forget their work and the love they have shown Him as they had helped His people and continue to help them.' (Hebrews 6:10)

Internal fundraising for our vision continued to be a great team effort, with some fabulous fundraising events including concerts with St Mary's Singers Hemsby and Happy Day Gospel Choir, Craft and Crumpets, Bible Readathon, London Marathon, Quiz Night, Afternoon Tea, Pilgrim's Progress film showing. Thank you to those who organised and supported these and many more individual acts of fundraising and giving. WBC also hosted joyous celebrations for our A Rocha Silver Eco Award and a Volunteers Celebration.

Reaching out...

Throughout the year, WBC premises welcomed various groups and activities such as Rosedale's bereavement courses, Trussell Trust Foodbank, Shelter advice sessions, Menscraft, Kett's Books Author event, Book Club, School Uniform Bank. And of course Roots Community Café, served thousands of people during the year, and Home from Home welcomes increasing numbers, and both are meeting people's needs on many levels.

These outward-facing activities are set to expand further with the new building extension, allowing us to reach out to those who do not yet know the Lord Jesus and who need a helping hand from Him through us. We aim to share our building and provide a safe and comfortable space for other helping organisations. It will also be a base from which to launch witness outreach initiatives beyond our walls, wherever God leads us.

Looking ahead with confidence in our God...

The building extension work will significantly impact our fellowship in the coming year, which will be exciting and no doubt challenging too! As Paul reminds us, the building extension is a means to achieve the WBC vision rather than an end itself. We believe the Lord is equipping us to 'fish for people' (Matthew 4:19) and that 2024 has been a year of significant preparation: not just in terms of building and finance, but also us as a fellowship. Through united working and praying together, our hearts are being drawn into ever closer fellowship with God and with one another as 'stand firm in one Spirit, with one mind striving side by side for the faith of the gospel'. Treasurer

During 2024 we have once again see God at work with out finances. The budget agreed at our January 2024 church meeting was challenging with a big increase in giving needed to meet our budgeted expenditure. Thankyou for your sacrificial giving to the General Fund and indeed to the Building Fund. We have received grants from South Norfolk DC and NCF Surviving Winter Fund, this has helped us to meet our electricity bills. We have experienced difficulty in getting our account with our electricity provider



clear but have managed to meet the bills that we have been presented with.

During 2024 we have continued to tithe all that has been given by the fellowship. These tithes have been given to BMS, Falconer Trust and GEM in support of Rachel Spencer and the tithe on the Building Fund giving to

There have been a number of fund raising events in support of our Building Fund. These have helped us to share in social events as well as raise money and spend time with the local community.

We have increased our Reserve Fund by £100 a month, thus the reserve over the year has increased by £1,200. This keeps our reserve in line with our policy to hold in hand sufficient to cover three months salaries and utility costs.

We have reported monthly to the Leadership Team so that they can monitor spending and income. Our books this year are being audited by a local

accountant as we prepare for more monies passing through our accounts during 2025. The full audited financial report is available to anyone who wishes to have a read and this report will be presented to the Charity Commission.

Buildings, Garden and Maintenance

Church Building

In view of the effort being put into the planning of the proposed extension, much of the maintenance on the church building during 2024 has been very much on a "make do and mend" basis during the past 12 months.

There are several major schemes currently under consideration, including solar panels, LED lighting, heating and the removal and transfer of one of the two meters we currently have. This will undoubtedly have an impact on the fabric of the church building which will require some redecoration to be carried out.

The project to install the LED lighting and the removal of one of the electricity meters will now be caried out during the Easter break. This has been possible by anonymous donation from a church member specifically earmarked for this work.

Two projects are currently in progress. There has been a problem with mould in the tower at the front of the church building, this is partly caused by the lack of air flow.

The church meeting in November approved the that remedial work, including redecoration be carried out at a cost of £4,400, to deal with the mould problem. This work will be carried out during the first quarter of 2025. The second project is the replacing of the barge boards and cap at the end of old school room. Penny and John Seal have very kindly offered undertake this work. Timber has been purchased and is being prepared for installation. As with all old buildings constant maintenance is required, the floor in the old school room and the roof both the school room and over the toilet/kitchen/office areas will need our attention soon. Work is on-going to ascertain the extent, cost and the scheduling of this work. Grants are available for us to apply for some of the work that is required.

Minor repairs carried out in 2024

- 1. Repair of pew seating at rear of church.
- 2. Replacing three light fittings in school room.
- 3. Replacing two light fittings in toilets.
- 4. Replace toilet seat in lady's toilet.
- 5. Beading around stage re-fixed and made safe

Ongoing Projects in 2025

- 1. Decoration of main church doors.
- 2. Decoration of lobby areas.
- 3. Work in preparation for the anticipated commencement of the building work on the extension.

It is planned to invite church members to participate in working parties to undertake this work

Garden

Regular hedge trimming and grass cutting during the spring and summer along with autumn scarifying and aeration has carried out and improvement in the general condition of the grassed area is there to be seen.

Projects undertaken in 2024

- 1. Purchase and erection of shed to store the outdoor toys, this was funded by the Church ECO Group.
- 2. Paved area laid to accommodate circular table.
- 3. Wildflower area and bird feeding station Installed.

Future Projects

- 1. Provision of new seating area.
- 2. Removal of Colocasia esculenta (Elephants Ear) to create a new storage area for waste bins.
- 3. Replace table benches

<u>Manse</u>

Work has continued in replacing windows and doors at the manse, this will continue during 2025.

Outreach and Mission

Many of our Mission and Outreach activities and connections are covered in other reports, but here are others that are not:

Rachel Spencer

Rachel has been working in Paris with GEM (Greater Europe Mission) seeking to bring the gospel to a nation which is deeply secular, though with a significant Muslim population in the region where she is living. However, she has make the decision to move back to the UK to develop her ministry. She writes:

"Things will be changing for me in the Spring of 2025. After close to 8 years in France I will be returning to the UK for an extended period of time. Although I plan to return to France in the future, at the moment I'm not sure when that will be. I will be based in East London, and will continue to work for Greater Europe Mission in partnership with Urban Expression, an organisation that is called to "mission in the margins", reaching people in urban communities who face economic, social, and personal challenges.

I've decided to make this move for several reasons. One is that it will be good to be closer to my parents as they deal with various health issues. I'm also feeling the need for a break from ministry in France especially after the last couple of years which have not been easy. I will be joining a strong and supportive Christian community in London, and can take time to work out what I need for an eventual return to France. And finally I'm excited to learn from Urban Expression and from the leaders of the East London project, as they have built something that I would love to recreate in France one day (I will write again to tell you more about the actual project in the new year).

I will continue with my PhD, and am looking forward to being able to plug in to the various missiology networks in the UK, which are far more extensive than they are in France. I will make fairly regular trips over to Paris for research, and to keep up the relationships that I have here.

As I will continue to be employed by Greater Europe Mission in London, I will continue to need the financial support that makes it possible for me to do this work. If you support me already I would like to ask you to prayerfully consider continuing to do so. As ever, I'm very grateful for all your support, prayers, and interest in my work."

At WBC we support Rachel's work through our church tithes as well as our prayers.

Alan and Megan Barker

Alan and Megan Barker are currently based in Nepal working under the umbrella of BMS. Megan works as an occupational therapist, and Alan works in project management.

In recent months Megan has been involved in several 'wheelchair distribution camps', meeting the needs of disabled folk in different parts of Nepal. Reflecting on the wheelchair distribution camp in Chaurjahari, a side benefit for Megan was being in the hospital staff accommodation and getting to know some of the team there and being encouraged by their work and enthusiasm.

It was quite tiring for her getting everything ready as, although the wheelchairs had arrived, they were not fully unpacked and ready to go, but the local team rallied round to help. Part of the work has been in areas devastated by recent earthquakes, where there is great need.

Over Christmas Alan and Megan were able to spend time with family, who all came to visit them in Nepal.

In addition to their work in Nepal, Alan and Megan also have a wider role with BMS and that side of things has been quite slow until recently but has become busier in the last few months. Alan has run online seminars with a BMS partner in Uganda. They have since run an in-person workshop with another partner in Nepal, where they looked at organisational planning and reporting. More online sessions are planned, this time with a BMS partner organisation in Mozambique. At the end of February they are heading off to Bangladesh and India to visit BMS partners there and to learn about what they are doing and to share some ideas on strategy, planning, leadership and development. It is hoped that all of the workshops will open the way for them to be more actively training and supporting at least some of these partners in their important work.

At WBC we support Alan and Megan's work through our church tithes as well as our prayers.

The Falconer Trust

The Falconer Home in Kabulamema, Zambia currently provides a home for around sixty children of all ages from 2 years to mid-teens.

In June 2024 Neil visited the Home, along with one of the trustees, Dennis Webb. These visits are important, because it enables the Trust to see first hand the needs of the Home, and discuss with Simon and other staff important matters regarding the future. It is also a great way to encourage, and to meet the children who are at the heart of the work.

During last year's visit we discussed the need for an irrigation system at the Home's farm. This is because of the severe drought which has blighted much of southern Africa in recent times, causing crops to fail, and bringing about food insecurity. Since returning, we have been greatly blessed to receive a

large amount of funding for the project, and installation of equipment is now underway. A 10-minute video about the project can be viewed on YouTube from this link:

- We still have our recycling point in the corridor. Items that can be collected vary but the latest information is on the board. The latest addition to the scheme is a box for recycling ink cartridges which is situated in church
- As in previous years, we displayed our Easter and Christmas cards on a communal board which was very well used. Not only does this cut down on the number of cards bought and sent, but it also allows us all to read the heartfelt messages from the senders

In 2024 we have taken you through the stories of Charlie and the chocolate factory, The Lion King, The Plank and Harry Potter.

We are a team of mainly novices, who at times get very scared and wonder why we have volunteered to stand up the front and speak. We fully appreciate the opportunity we are given and the trust that the church members have invested in us to lead the service in this way. Attendance numbers are in the region of 75-85, with a few people continuing to only attend church because it is Café Church week.

Café Church sessions require hours of planning and a lot of volunteers to make them possible. We thank all those who have helped us over the year, with the food prep, with the slides and sound, setting up tables and chairs, welcoming, children's craft and the clearing away. But most of all we thank you for supporting us in prayer. You are great cheer leaders, often encouraging us to continue what has become a successful and established part of the WBC service calendar.

Looking ahead to 2025 we are very pleased to have Jan H join the team. I first saw her in action during the summer programme of services and I was so entertained and wowed by her skills, that I knew she would be perfect for Café Church. I thank her greatly for saying yes!

Home from Home

At the beginning of 2024 we were opening our doors as a Warm Space on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month. The numbers coming along at this time were very often quite few, however we continued to offer a warm welcome to whoever came along. The afternoon was spent playing games, doing jigsaw puzzles, drinking tea and coffee and generally chatting. We stopped meeting from Easter 2024. In the summer we asked for more help and I am so pleased to report that we gained some additional helpers - Kate, Rose, Val



and Penny are my regular helpers, and so we opened in October 2024 meeting every Thursday afternoon as we felt that there had been some confusion as to which Thursdays we

were meeting earlier in the year. Since this time we have welcomed new people most weeks and now

each Thursday afternoon the church lounge is busy with different people joining us - some from the church and some from outside the church. We regularly have visitors brought by JCS (Norfolk) Ltd who offer a caring service to those in our community suffering from dementia. As well as a warm space Home from Home offers somewhere for folk to spend





time together, reducing their loneliness. Before each session we spend a short time in prayer committing our afternoon to God as we seek to offer friendship and God's love to those who come in. We offer tea and coffee, cake, toast, soup and other nibbles as well as a listening ear, things to do and friendly conversation. We will continue to offer this warm space until Easter and are thinking about whether we can offer

something else during the summer months and what we should offer next Autumn, Winter and Spring when hopefully the building work will be going on. Please pray that those who come along will be aware of God's love that is available to everyone.

Building Project Team Extension

Give thanks for the very significant progress made in 2024. We raised the necessary finance to carry out the detail design work and obtained a grant to help towards the costs.



So we started this work in April 2024 with the architect and structural engineer putting flesh on the bones of the planning permission. This was supported by trial pits dug in the car park to understand the quality of the foundations of the existing buildings and the nature of the underlying ground conditions. Input from an energy consultant was also received to clarify the heating proposed for the extension and to advise on the possibility of solar panels. The detailed design was essentially completed in November, with acceptance of

our proposals for "building regulations plan approval" (a bit of a mouthful but basically agreement on how we demonstrate we comply with the relevant regulations during construction).

The detail design work then feeds in to the tender documents to be supplied to prospective builders at the end of January 2025. The detail work has come in under budget and we have also received over £18,000 from the Pride in Place grant received from South Norfolk Council towards this work. We give thanks for the work of the professionals and the grant provider.

That we are now in a position to go out to tender is a tribute to the fund raising of the church, both internally and externally. The amount raised or promised towards the total budget project cost of £520,000 stands at £429,000 at the year end, which is amazing. We do still have a "funding gap" of £91,000 we need to close before we can proceed to construction. Thank God for his provision so far and pray that we will find the remaining funds needs to enable a start on site in the Summer of 2025.

By the time you read this report we would hope to know the outcome of the tender process, and God willing with the funding too, which would then see us start on the actual extension in the Summer of 2025.

WBC Building Project External Fund-Raising Steering Group (Creating a place for Everyone)

During 2024, the group has meet monthly, with the objective of applying for grants to raise funds for the building extension.

By December 2024, the external funding steering group has:

- Reviewed in excess of 120 potential funders NB we need to meet the criteria for a capital project, be community focussed, supporting vulnerable people, amongst many other conditions.
- Applied to over 30 grant awarding bodies.
- Received awards from nine grant awarding bodies and had grants refused by five.
- Received £350,138 in grant awards (see the summary below).
- Secured funding to support Phase 2 feasibility study of the building project.
- Revised the project programme (timeline) for the building of the extension which we hope will commence in summer of 2025 - subject to all the funding being secured.
- Described the impact of the extension over the coming years (Outcomes). This will enable the church to track the changes over time.
