

A word from Rosedale Bereavement Support.....

I don't know about you, but to me, the world we now live in feels unrecognisable to the one I grew up in. Life seems to be changing at such a pace, I can hardly keep up! The rapid rise of social media has led to everyone being able to share their own story, making sure their voice is heard and their point is made. Interrupting and shouting others down seems to have become acceptable behaviour on TV and radio interviews and life in general.

As someone working in the field of counselling for many years, I have noticed a subtle change of late. It now seems that in general, whilst everyone wants to be heard, there aren't many people who are prepared to listen.

A big part of my counselling training was learning how to really listen, making sure that the speaker feels truly heard and understood.

Listening is such a valuable gift to give someone, all it costs us is our time.

When someone is bereaved, they often want to talk about their loved one. They miss them and are in their thoughts constantly. They don't want them to be forgotten and talking about them can be one way of keeping their memory alive.

Many bereaved people report that often people avoid mentioning their loved one in conversation. Perhaps they want to avoid causing further upset or don't know what to say to make things better? The truth is the bereaved person is already upset and almost nothing anyone says can make things better!

Grief can also make some people feel very uncomfortable- perhaps it reminds them of their own past bereavements? Or they prefer to avoid talking about messy emotions, preferring to keep the 'stiff upper lip'?

Of course, some people prefer to grieve privately. We all have our own way of dealing with grief, there is no right or wrong way.

However, making time to listen to someone talk about their loved one and their bereavement can provide an outlet for grief, making them feel less lonely and isolated. It also demonstrates respect and helps to build stronger and more supportive relationships.

Perhaps we all need to slow down a bit, respect each other more and create some space to listen.

North Norfolk Coast - A Feast For The Senses

'He has made everything beautiful in it's time ' Ecclesiastes chapter 3 verse 11

We have just spent a few gloriously sunny early autumn days on the North Norfolk coast enjoying that lovely area. Having time to take life slowly with no pressing responsibilities meant we could really appreciate our surroundings.

Walking part of the Norfolk coast path there is so much to see and hear. There's the wild beauty of the salt marshes and muddy channels leading to the sand dunes and the sea beyond them. Boats that looked stranded on the mud at low tide but afloat on the incoming tide and some that hadn't moved for years, skeins of geese in flight in the distance, curlews probing the mud with their long beaks and the call of oystercatchers. Change direction and there are reeds as far as the eye can see, blown by the wind and making a soft whispering sound so typical of many parts of Norfolk.



Then of course there are the wonderful beaches. Brancaster beach in the late afternoon of a fine September day is breathtakingly beautiful. Huge Norfolk skies, air so pure and clear to



fill our lungs, golden sands contrasting with deep blue sea, white waves breaking out at sea and on the beach and a cloudless blue sky. Holkham beach where the boardwalk passes through pinewoods which scent the air and the beach is out of sight until you have either crossed a large area of marshy ground or walked around it on sandy paths until you reach an opening between the dunes and the great expanse of beach comes into view with the sea still far away. Crab salad rolls from the Crab Hut at Brancaster Staithe were the perfect picnic food.

So we really did spend a few days feasting with so many good things to see, hear, smell and taste! We didn't take any photos but the images will stay in our heads for a long time. We feel very blessed to have so many beautiful places so close to home and the time to go away for a few days and enjoy them.

Autumnal Abundance

Have you noticed just how many nuts and berries there are this year? There is a word for such a year: a *Mast* year. So what is a mast year and why does it happen? The following explanation was written by Lorienne Whittle, Citizen Science Officer at the Woodland Trust in 2020:

'Every species of tree and shrub has a distinctive way of reproducing. Autumn is the prime time to see this and can help us recognise different species too. Acorns, conkers, winged seeds and an

array of fruits, berries and cones make autumn's colourful leaf displays even more enjoyable.

Every few years, some species of trees and shrubs produce a bumper crop of their fruits or nuts. The collective term for these fruits and nuts is 'mast', so we call this a mast year.

Two of our most recognisable trees, oak and beech, fluctuate massively year on year in the amount of acorns and beech nuts they produce. Some years seem to have very little while in others, the nuts create a thick carpet beneath the trees.


Why do trees produce bumper crops?

One of the main theories for this behaviour is 'predator satiation'. Take oak and beech as an example again. Animals like squirrels, <u>jays</u>, mice and <u>badgers</u> feed on the acorns and beech nuts. When the trees produce smaller crops for a few consecutive years, they are in effect keeping the populations of these animals in check. But during a mast year, the trees produce more food than the animals can possibly eat.

This abundance causes a boom in populations of small mammals like mice. More importantly, it guarantees some will be left over to survive and grow into new trees. Mast years have a major evolutionary advantage for the tree. Producing nuts is costly work and slightly stunts the tree's growth, but as it tends to happen every 5-10 years, it's worth the payoff for some of the crop to germinate into new saplings.'

Amazing!! Not only are we able to enjoy the beauty and abundance of this autumnal harvest but God is providing for the whole of His creation and keeping everything in balance.

Green Lifestyle Audit 2025

It seems a long time ago but, back in March, Hannah Gray came to lead our worship and talked about the work of A Rocha and our responsibility as stewards of God's creation. She left us with a green lifestyle audit. This was a very quick, easy and encouraging survey to do. It was divided into 3 sections, light green, green and dark green actions (from simpler to more challenging actions), and gave us an opportunity to remind ourselves of what we already do, to pledge to make further changes and to recognise that we can't do everything!!

Although originally meant for personal use, we had 9 audits handed in, and the results are below.

Extension - Phase 3 - Construction work has now started but the Church is still open on Sundays!

Summary

Phase 1 - Planning Permission

Received December 2022

Phase 2 - Detail Design Development

Finished January 2025, with costs coming in under budget.

Phase 3 - Construction

The work has begun with demolition of the former extension, boarding up to protect the rest of the premises and groundworks are under way to prepare for the foundations for the new extension. The photo below shows the progress as at 19th September 2025.



Please pray for safety for all working on the buildings and that the work will be completed on time and under budget. Pray too for the Church as it considers its priorities for what it should do with the expanded premises to better serve the community.

Longer Term

Consideration is being given to the remainder of the church buildings, to what else we need to do to bring them up to standard, subject to having funds available. This includes repairs to church windows, consideration of solar panels and improved heating to help reduce ongoing electricity costs and the feasibility of improving the road surface in front of the church car park. Some of these areas of work may require planning permission.

While we are naturally delighted that funding is in place to complete the extension, the Church recognises that funds will still be needed to complete the works to bring the remainder of the building up to standard. and that during this day I may reveal You.




